St. Matthias Episcopal Church Celebrates its 160th Anniversary

St. Matthias Episcopal Church celebrated its I60th anniversary with a prayer service and reception on October 25. Speakers included longtime member and first female Senior Warden Barbara Jones, former rector The Rev. James Abbott, Osondu McPeters, The Reverend Deacon Glenda McDowell and The Reverend Canon Augusta Anderson, Canon to the Ordinary for the Diocese of Western North Carolina.

The congregation also celebrated the newly completed renovation of its chapel, made possible by donations and grants from a variety of sources.

St. Matthias is well known as one of the nine foundational churches of the East End/Valley Street (EEVS) neighborhood. The congregation provided community outreach from its earliest beginnings: it was the location of the first school for Blacks in Asheville, beginning in 1872, and as far as we know was the only school for Blacks in the city until the first public school opened in 1885. St. Matthias is also recognized as an important heritage site in Asheville and Buncombe County. The church had 1,300 – 1,500 visitors during 2023 from Hood Huggers International tours and the James Vester Miller Historic Trail. It is also a highlight on the new Asheville African American Heritage Trail which has just begun to be popularized.

Currently, St. Matthias collaborates closely with EEVS Neighborhood Association and other churches in the neighborhood on keeping the food pantry and children's "little library" full, and we are well known for our support and "church fans" given for neighborhood festivals and other events.

Andrea Clark, granddaughter of James Vester Miller, was a photographer who documented life in the East End before urban renewal. Born and reared in Cambridge, Mass., Clark came to Asheville in 1968 to live with her father in the East End. Her photographs reflect an exploration into her roots, and into a world very different from the one she had known in New England. They provide a valuable portrait of a neighborhood, as well as an exploration into the meaning of community.

It was Clark's vision to create a walking tour of her grandfather's buildings to honor his work and to highlight the important role that African Americans have played in building Asheville. Clark passed away in 2025.

Some of Clark's work is kept in the Buncombe County Special Collections archive and has been displayed in exhibits at the Asheville Museum of History, YMI Cultural Center and the Pack Memorial Library. She won the Sondley Award from the Preservation Society of Asheville & Buncombe County in 2020 for her photos, which vary from portraits to streetscapes to intimate depictions of daily life in the East End/Valley Street neighborhood.

Report crime using TIP2APD


The Asheville Police Department (APD) is putting a new crime-fighting tool into the hands of community members. This new tool, TIP2APD, enables the public to share anonymous tips with police officers and lets officers respond to create an anonymous two-way conversation.

The tool also allows the community to find information on incidents APD is currently asking for help with and to receive alerts about crime activity in their city.

The application is available for free download for iPhone and Android users via the <u>iTunes App Store</u> or <u>Google Play Store</u> by searching "AshevillePD"

Individuals without a smartphone can share information with police by sending an anonymous text tip via their cell phone by texting the keyword TIP2APD and their message/tip to 8474II.

The TIP2APD tool is only for non-emergencies and is not a replacement for 9-I-I. In the event of an emergency, please dial 9-I-I immediately.

East End's Oldest Living Resident Passes Away at

Born August 6, 1923, Mrs. Poole was the oldest

living resident of the East End/Valley Street neighborhood. She was honored at East End's 2022 Community Heritage Festival at the age of 100.
